Alberta Provincial Politics Carbon Levy and Rebate Program

Alberta Public Opinion Study – February 2019

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### Methodology

Population: The province of Alberta has a total population of 4,334,025 residents (Statistics Canada, 2018) approximately 78% of which are 18 years of age or older for an adult population of 3,380,540.

Sample: Data were collected by Lethbridge College students in the winter of 2019. Students interviewed 1,055 adult Alberta residents by telephone from February 2 to 5, 2019 under the supervision of principal investigator Dr. Faron Ellis, Research Chair, Citizen Society Research Lab. Landline, hybrid and mobile telephone numbers were selected from a sample drawn from InfoGroup directories and supplemented by CSRL lists. Representativeness: Analysis of the demographic data indicates that, within acceptable limits, the sample accurately represents the demographic distribution of the adult population within the province of Alberta. The sample has been statistically weighted where necessary to even better reflect the demographic distribution of the population (gender, area of province and age).

Confidence: The weighted sample yields a margin of error  $\pm 3.0$  percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error increases when analyzing sub-samples of the data (Calgary  $\pm 5.6$  percentage points, Edmonton and immediate area  $\pm 5.8$  percentage points, North  $\pm 6.3$  percentage points 19 times out of 20).

IB Commons Call Centre: Students conducted interviews using the facilities of the Lethbridge College IB Commons Call Centre. We thank members of Lethbridge College's ITS and AV teams for their support in helping maintain the IB Commons Call Center.

Sponsorship: These data are part of a larger study of the opinions and attitudes of Alberta residents conducted by the Citizen Society Research Lab at Lethbridge College. These questions were derived from student and faculty interest in the topics.

Carbon Levy and Rebate Program

- After two years of experience with the Alberta government's carbon levy and rebate policies, nearly two-thirds of Albertans (65.4%) remain opposed, nearly as many as those opposed at the same time in 2016 before full details of the rebate structure where known to voters (67.2%). Slightly more than one-third of Albertans are supportive (34.6%), similar to the one-third (32.8%) who thought similarly in 2016. Only 6.1% of Albertans were undecided about these policies while 0.8% refused to answer, these cases have been removed from the tabular data below.
- Delving deeper reveals that opposition is much more intense than is support. For example, nearly half of Albertans (48.8%) are strongly opposed to the government's carbon program while only 12.7% are strongly supportive. Moderate support (21.9%) is only slightly greater than moderate opposition (16.5%).
- Majorities in all areas of the province are opposed, although Edmonton support (47.7%) is nearly as great as is the opposition in the provincial capital area (52.3%). Substantial majorities in all other areas of the province are opposed, with opposition strongest in northern Alberta (79.4%), followed by Calgary (69.9%) and southern Alberta (61.3%).
- Partisanship is the best predictor of opinion about the carbon levy and rebate program. A substantial majority of provincial NDP voters (77.5%) support the plan, as does a clear majority of provincial Liberal voters (59.1%). Conversely, clear majorities of Alberta Party voters (73.7%) and UCP supporters (85.5%) are opposed, as is a majority of undecided voters (55.5%).
- Similarly, a substantial majority of federal Conservative voters are opposed (83.2%), while strong majorities of federal Liberal (80.0%) and NDP (79.7%) voters approve of the plan. Interesting, a majority of the small number of federal Green voters are opposed (64.3%).
- Men (69.0%) are slightly more opposed than are women (61.5%). Although a majority of university graduates (52.3%) are opposed, they are much less opposed than are other education groups, all of which indicate much stronger majority opposition. Age and household income have no significant impact on support or opposition levels with strong majorities of all income and age groups opposed.
