Alberta Carbon Tax and Rebate Program Lethbridge Public Opinion Study – Winter 2017

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Methodology

Population The city of Lethbridge has a total population of 96,828 residents (2016 census) approximately 80% of which are 18 years of age or older (77,500). A total of 47,457 Lethbridge residents are male (49%) while 49,371 are female (51%). South Lethbridge is home to 31,720 residents (32.8%) while the rapidly expanding west side is now home to 37,929 residents (39.2%). There are 27,179 north Lethbridge residents (28.1%).

Sample Data Collected by Lethbridge College students in 11 courses enrolled in a variety of Lethbridge College programs in the winter of 2017. Students interviewed 1,501 randomly selected adult Lethbridge residents by telephone on February 11-16, 2017 under the supervision of CSRL Research Chair, Faron Ellis. We sincerely appreciate and thank all those who took time to respond to our survey. Representativeness Analysis of the demographic data indicates that, within acceptable limits, the sample accurately represents the demographic distribution of the adult population within the city of Lethbridge. The sample has been statistically weighted to even better reflect that of the population (sex, age, and area of the city of Lethbridge).

Confidence The sample yields a margin of error of ± 2.5 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error increases when analyzing sub-samples of the data.

IB Commons Call Centre The CSRL operates as a division of the Centre for Applied Arts and Sciences. Students conducted interviews using the facilities of the Lethbridge College IB Commons Call Centre, drawing on support from the Lethbridge College Facility Management team, Instructional Technology, Audio Visual, and the Centre for Applied Research and Innovation.

Sponsorship These data are part of a larger study of the opinions and attitudes of Lethbridge residents conducted by the Citizen Society Research Lab at Lethbridge College. This particular set of questions was derived from student, faculty and community interest in the topic.



Carbon Tax and Rebate Program

On January 1, 2017, Albertans began paying the provincial government's carbon tax on gasoline, diesel, propane and natural gas. Later in the month, over sixty percent of Alberta families received a carbon rebate from the government, the amount of which varied depending on their income and number of dependent children.

When asked to express their opinions about the provincial government's carbon tax and rebate program, a sizable majority of Lethbridge residents stated they are opposed (64.3%). Slightly more than one-third of Lethbridge residents (35.7%) are supportive.

- While a slight majority was opposed in 2016 (56.6%), nearly two-thirds (64.3%) of Lethbridge residents are now opposed
- Support levels have decreased from 43.4% in 2016, to slightly more than one-third in 2017 (35.7%).

- Men (66.7%) are slightly more opposed than are women (62.4%), but these differences not statistically significant.
- Northside residents are most opposed (69.5%), followed by southside residents (63.9%) and westsiders (60.9%).
- Middle-income residents are more opposed (65.5%) than are upper-income (61.7%) and lower-income (60.6%) residents.
- Less well-educated residents are more opposed than are well-educated residents, but majorities of residents in all education categories are opposed.
- Seniors and gen-Xers are more opposed than are youth and boomers, but age differences are slight and not statistically significant.
- Partisanship is the most important factor in determining opinion.
 - Provincial partisanship is most important with 80.4% of NDP voters supporting the tax and rebate plans. Only 10.1% of Wildrose partisans and 18.0% of PC voters are supportive. Provincial Liberal partisans are more evenly divided.
 - Federal partisanship shows similar division with 66.5% of Liberal voters and 75.5% of NDP voters supportive. Conversely, 85.6% of Conservative supporters are opposed. Federal Green Party supporters are more evenly divided in their opinions.
- Although we were prepared to offer supplemental information to respondents who believed they did have enough information to render an opinion, 96.9% of respondents did not request further information; 1.3% requested information only about the taxes, 0.4% asked for information only about rebates, while 1.4% asked for information about both taxes and rebates.
