# Alberta Provincial Politics

Public Use Areas Protection Plans: OHV and Random Camping Restrictions

Alberta Public Opinion Study – October 2017



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### Methodology

- **Population** The province of Alberta has a total population of 4,286,134 residents (Alberta Economic Dashboard) approximately 78% of which are 18 years of age or older for an adult population of 3,343,200.
- Sample Data were collected by Lethbridge College students in the fall of 2017. Students interviewed 1,481 adult Alberta residents by telephone from September 30 to October 5, 2017 under the supervision of principal investigator Dr. Faron Ellis, Research Chair, Citizen Society Research Lab. Landline telephone numbers were selected from a sample drawn from InfoGroup directories and supplemented with a selection of mobile numbers from CSRL lists. - Representativeness Analysis of the demographic data indicates that, within acceptable limits, the sample accurately represents the demographic distribution of the adult population within the province of Alberta. The sample has been statistically weighted where necessary to even better reflect the demographic distribution of the population (gender and age).
- Confidence The weighted sample yields a margin of error ± 2.55 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error increases when analyzing sub-samples of the data (Calgary ± 4.9 percentage points, Edmonton and immediate area ± 5.1 percentage points, North ± 5.2 percentage points, South ± 4.9 percentage points 19 times out of 20).
- **IB Commons Call Centre** Students conducted interviews using the facilities of the Lethbridge College IB Commons Call Centre. We thank members of Lethbridge College's ITS and AV teams for their support in helping maintain the IB Commons Call Center.
- **Sponsorship** These data are part of a larger study of the opinions and attitudes of Alberta residents conducted by the Citizen Society Research Lab at Lethbridge College. These questions were derived from student and faculty interest in the topics.




#### **HOV Restrictions**


- A clear majority of Albertans (55.1%) support the provincial government placing further restrictions on the use of off-highway vehicles in Alberta's public use areas. Most of those (44.1%) believe OHV use should be more restricted than it is now, while 11.0% believe OHV use should be completely banned in all public use areas. One-quarter of Albertans think current OHV use restrictions are fine as they are, while one in five Albertans (19.8%) believe there should be fewer restrictions on OHV use. Most of those (13.7%) believe restrictions should be somewhat relaxed while 6.1% would like to see no restrictions at all on OHV use in Alberta's public spaces.
- Women (64.3%) are more supportive of greater restrictions than are men (46.2%).
- Southern Albertans are least supportive of increased restrictions (44.2%) and the south is the only region without majority support for greater restrictions. Southern residents are also the most likely to want fewer restrictions (26.2%).
- Lower income residents are less supportive of greater restrictions than are other income groups, and are also most supportive of fewer restrictions.
- University grads are most supportive of greater restrictions (68.2%) while less well-educated residents are less supportive but still
  more likely to support more restrictions than fewer.
- Middle-aged and senior residents are more supportive of greater restrictions than are Alberta's youth, who are more likely to favor fewer restrictions than greater restrictions. In fact, the youth are the only group to demonstrate greater support for reduced (38.7%) restrictions than greater restrictions (31.3%).
- NDP voters provincial (76.7%) and federal (76.9%) are most supportive of greater restrictions while other partisans are less supportive of increased restrictions, but still more supportive of greater restrictions than fewer.









### Random Camping Restrictions


- Slightly more than two of every five Albertans (42.0%) support the provincial government placing greater restrictions on random camping in Alberta's public use spaces. Approximately three of every ten (29.6%) believe current restrictions are adequate, while nearly the same amount (28.4%) would like to see fewer restrictions on random camping. Like with OHV restrictions, opinion about further restricting random camping is not polarized, with less than one in ten Albertans wanting either a total ban (8.0%) or no restrictions at all (9.3%).
- Women (48.4%) more likely to want greater restrictions than are men (35.6%), who are equally likely to want fewer restrictions (35.6%).
- No significant regional differences emerge although the south, like with OHV restrictions, is again the least supportive of greater restrictions.
- Lower income residents are again the least supportive of greater restrictions.
- University graduates are more supportive of greater restrictions (52.8%) than are other education groups and are one of the few demographic groups to demonstrate majority support for greater restrictions on random camping.
- Age a is significant predictor of opinion. Alberta's youth have a clear preference for fewer restrictions (42.8%) compared to 27.1% who support greater restrictions, while a majority of seniors (52.8%) support greater restrictions, with very few seniors supporting less restriction (19.2%).
- NDP voters again distinguish themselves as more supportive of greater restrictions than are other partisans, but differences between partisans are not as pronounces with respect to random camping as with OHV restrictions.


