



# Albertans' Evaluations of Their Economic Situations for ACCESS Alberta Primetime

## Alberta Public Opinion Study – Fall 2010







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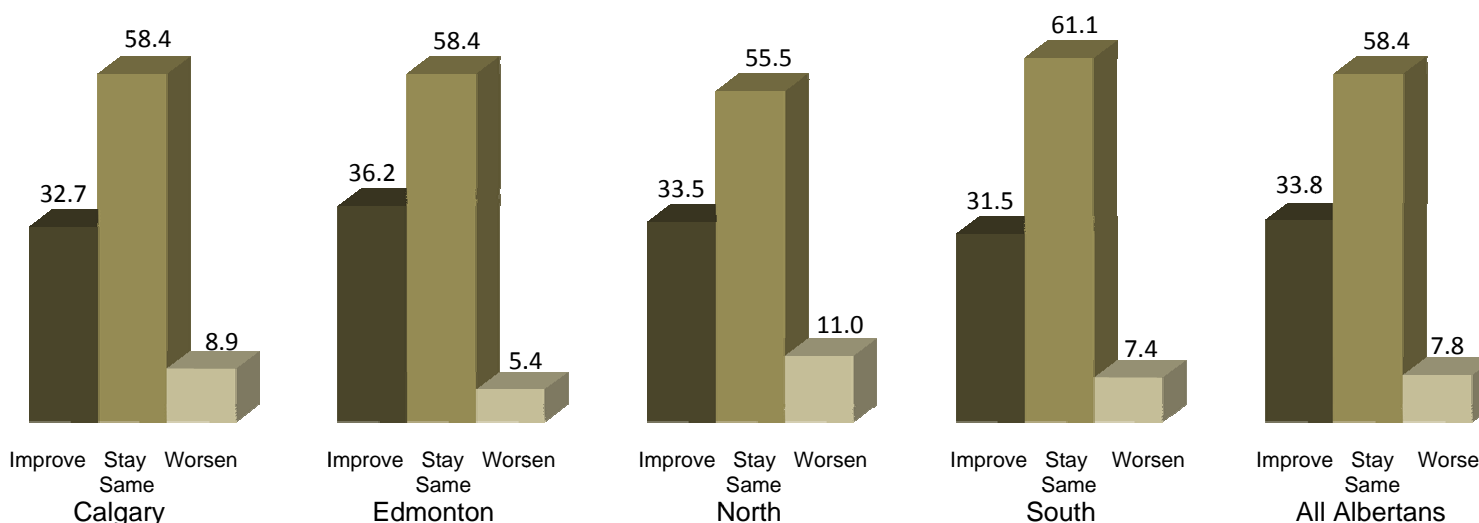


## Methodology

-  **Population** The province of Alberta has a total population of 3,720,946 residents (July 1, 2010) approximately 77% of which are 18 years of age or older for an adult population of approximately 2,865,000.
-  **Sample** Data were collected by Lethbridge College and Athabasca University students enrolled in STS270 – Social Science Research Methods and PSC150 – Local Government in the fall of 2010. Students interviewed 1,067 adult Alberta residents by telephone from October 2<sup>nd</sup> to 3<sup>rd</sup> 2010 under the supervision of Canadian Studies faculty members Faron Ellis PhD and Marda Schindeler MA. Telephone numbers were selected from a sample drawn from InfoCanada directories. We sincerely thank all participants who took time out of their day to respond to our inquiries. -  **Representativeness** Analysis of the demographic data indicates that, within acceptable limits, the sample accurately represents the demographic distribution of the adult population within the province of Alberta. The sample has been statistically weighted where necessary to even better reflect the demographic distribution of the population (gender and age).
-  **Confidence** The weighted sample yields a margin of error of  $\pm 3.0$  percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error increases when analyzing sub-samples of the data (Calgary  $\pm 5.1$  percentage points, Edmonton and immediate area  $\pm 5.3$  percentage points, North  $\pm 7.2$  percentage points, South  $\pm 7.6$  percentage points, 19 times out of 20).
-  **IB Commons Call Centre** Students conducted interviews using the facilities of the Lethbridge College IB Commons Call Centre and applications developed by the Open Source Learning Lab (OSLL). We thank James Manis PhD and OSLL for their efforts in working with us to establish and maintain the IB Commons Call Centre.
-  **Sponsorship** These data are part of a larger study of the opinions and attitudes of Alberta residents conducted by the Citizen Society Research Lab at Lethbridge College. ## Albertans' evaluations of how their families' economic situation will change in the next year

- A majority of Albertans (58.4%) foresee no change to their personal (immediate family's) economic situation over the course of the next year. Of those who are anticipating some change, optimists outnumber pessimists by more than four to one. Over one-third of all Albertans (33.8%) believe their personal economic situation will improve over the next twelve months while only 7.8% believe their economic situation will worsen.
- Little variance in opinion is measured between the various regions of the province although it is noteworthy that Edmontonians are now the most optimistic with 36.2% anticipating their situations will improve. Northern Alberta is home to the greatest proportion of pessimists (11.0%), although even northerners are three times more likely to be optimistic than pessimistic.

## Albertans' evaluations of how their families' economic situation will change in the next year

- Men (37.7%) are slightly more optimistic than are women (29.8%).
- The wealthy (41.3%) are considerably more optimistic than are middle income (31.4%) and lower income (32.7%) Albertans.
- Few differences in opinion are evident amongst the various education groups, although those with some post secondary schooling but no diploma/degree are the most optimistic (41.7%) and the least pessimistic (6.7%).
- Gen-xers (41.8%) and the youth (55.9%) are considerably more optimistic than are boomers (25.0%) and especially seniors (12.9%).
- Remarkably few differences are evident between the various groups of provincial party supporters.
- Also of note is the change in levels of optimism over the past year. That is, Albertans in all regions of the province are measurably more optimistic and less pessimistic about their future economic situations than they were at this time last year.
