Lethbridge Public Opinion Study – Winter 2010

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Methodology

- Population The city of Lethbridge has a total population of 85,492 residents (2009 municipal census) approximately 80.1% of which are 18 years of age or older (68,988). A total of 41,967 Lethbridge residents are male (49.1%) while 43,525 are female (50.9%). South Lethbridge is home to 30,168 residents (35.3%) while the rapidly expanding west side is now home to 30,489 residents (35.7%). There are 24,835 north Lethbridge residents (29.0%). Coaldale has a total population of 6,943 residents (2009 Census).
- Sample Data were collected by Lethbridge College and Athabasca University students enrolled in STS270 Social Science Research Methods in the winter of 2010. Students interviewed 888 adult Lethbridge and Coaldale residents by telephone on February 6 8, 2010 under the supervision of School of Liberal Arts faculty members Faron Ellis, PhD and Marda Schindeler, MA. Telephone numbers were selected from a sample drawn from InfoCanada directories. We sincerely appreciate and thank all those who took time to respond to our survey. - Representativeness Analysis of the demographic data indicates that, within acceptable limits, the sample accurately represents the demographic distribution of the adult population within the city of Lethbridge. The sample has been statistically weighted where necessary to even better reflect the demographic distribution of the population (gender, age and area of the city of Lethbridge).
- Confidence The weighted sample yields a margin of error of ± 3.27 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error increases when analyzing sub-samples of the data. For example, the margin of error is ± 3.5 percentage points, 19 times out of 20 for the Lethbridge subsample and ± 8.8 percentage points for the Coaldale subsample.




Federal Vote Intention (%)

- The governing Conservative Party of Canada (CPC) commands majority support amongst decided Lethbridge and Coaldale voters (54.1%), more than double that of its nearest competitor, the Liberals (22.4%) and five times more support than the federal New Democrats (11.5%). The federal Green Party commands 10.5% support while 1.5% of voters stated they would vote for some other party or candidate.
- The Conservatives have commanding leads in all demographic groups with the Liberals holding down second spot. Conservative support is strongest in its traditional areas of strength outside of the city of Lethbridge, among men, the wealthy and older voters.

Federal Vote Intention (%)

- Conservative support is widespread (they lead in every demographic category), deep in their traditional areas of strength, and within their traditional demographic groups.
- Coaldale residents (64.9%) are more supportive of the Conservatives than are Lethbridge residents (46.5%), but even in Lethbridge the Conservatives lead their nearest rivals, the Liberals (20.1%), by more than a two to one margin.
- Men (55.0%) are more supportive of the Conservatives than are women (40.9%) while women (22.3%) are slightly more likely than are men (17.1%) to support the Liberal party.
- Conservative support is highest among upper income earners (51.1%), as is Liberal support (24.1%). Interestingly, the NDP (8.7%) trails the Green party (12.1%) among lower income voters.
- The Conservatives garner slightly less support from university graduates (41.3%) than they do from those with other levels of education while the Liberals achieve their greatest support levels from university grads (26.9%).
- Conservative support increases substantially as age increases, topping out at 60.8% amongst seniors. A less pronounced and inverse trend exists in Liberal and NDP support with younger voters more inclined than older voters to support either of those parties.
- Conservative support also increases with religious participation while the Liberals and New Democrats receive higher support levels from those with the least amount of religious participation.
