Lethbridge Public Opinion Study – Winter 2011

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Methodology

- Population The city of Lethbridge has a total population of 86,659 residents (2010 municipal census) approximately 80% of which are 18 years of age or older (69,327). A total of 42,373 Lethbridge residents are male (48.9%) while 44,286 are female (51.1%). South Lethbridge is home to 30,144 residents (34.8%) while the rapidly expanding west side is now home to 31,399 residents (36.2%). There are 25,116 north Lethbridge residents (29.0%). Coaldale has a total population of 6,943 residents (2009 Census).
- Sample Data were collected by Lethbridge College and Athabasca University students enrolled in STS270 Social Science Research Methods in the winter of 2011. Students interviewed 771 adult Lethbridge and Coaldale residents by telephone on February 12–13, 2011 under the supervision of School of Liberal Arts faculty members Faron Ellis, PhD and Marda Schindeler, MA. Telephone numbers were selected from a sample drawn from InfoCanada directories. We sincerely appreciate and thank all those who took time to respond to our survey. - Representativeness Analysis of the demographic data indicates that, within acceptable limits, the sample accurately represents the demographic distribution of the adult population within the city of Lethbridge. The sample has been statistically weighted where necessary to even better reflect the demographic distribution of the population (gender, age and area of the city of Lethbridge).
- Confidence The weighted sample yields a margin of error of ± 3.51 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error increases when analyzing sub-samples of the data. For example, the Lethbridge subsample margin of error is ± 3.77 percentage points, 19 times out of 20; ± 9.52 percentage points for the Coaldale subsample, and ± 5.3 percentage points for each of the Lethbridge provincial electoral divisions.




Federal Vote Intention (%)

The governing Conservative Party of Canada (CPC) commands majority support amongst decided Lethbridge and Coaldale voters (dgg%), more than double that of its nearest competitor, the Liberals (dfhg%) and five times more support than the federal New Democrats (dgh%). The federal Green Party commands dg% support while dgh% of voters stated they would vote for some other party or candidate.

The Conservatives have commanding leads in all demographic groups with the Liberals holding down second spot. Conservative support is strongest in its traditional areas of strength outside of the city of Lethbridge, among men, the wealthy and older voters.

Federal Vote Intention (%)

- Federal Conservative party support is widespread (they lead in every demographic category), deep in their traditional areas of strength, and within their traditional demographic area of support such as seniors, the religious, and non-university grads.
- Coaldale residents (54.2%) are even more supportive of the Conservatives than are Lethbridge residents (48.8%), but even in Lethbridge the Conservatives lead their nearest rivals, the Liberals (18.2%), by more than a two to one margin.
- The Conservatives have virtually eliminated the traditional gender gap in their support with men (50.4%) only slightly more supportive of the Conservatives than are women (47.8%).
- Conservative support is approximately equal across all income categories while Liberal support is weakest amongst low income voters (16.1%). The NDP continues to garner its highest support levels from upper income voters (12.4%) while the Green party receives its highest support levels from lower income voters (8.8%).
- The Conservatives garner substantially less support from university graduates (38.8%%) than they do from those with other levels of education while the Liberals achieve their greatest support levels from university grads (21.9%) although the Conservatives still enjoy a commanding lead within this demographic group.
- Conservative support increases substantially as age increases, topping out at 62.2% amongst seniors. A less pronounced and inverse trend exists in Liberal and NDP support with younger voters more inclined than older voters to support either of those parties.
- Conservative support also increases with religious participation. Liberals support is relatively consistent between the religious and non-religious while and New Democrats receive higher support levels from those with the least amount of religious participation.
