Methodology

- Population The province of Alberta has a total population of 3,779,353 residents (Statistics Canada, July 1, 2011) approximately 77% of which are 18 years of age or older for an adult population of approximately 2,910,102.
- Sample Data were collected by Lethbridge College and Athabasca University students enrolled in STS270 Social Science Research Methods and PSC150 – Local Government in the fall of 2011. Students interviewed 1,237 adult Alberta residents by telephone from October 1st to 2nd 2011 under the supervision of Canadian Studies faculty members Faron Ellis PhD and Marda Schindeler MA. Telephone numbers were selected from a sample drawn from InfoCanada directories. We sincerely thank all participants who took time out of their day to respond to our inquiries. - Representativeness Analysis of the demographic data indicates that, within acceptable limits, the sample accurately represents the demographic distribution of the adult population within the province of Alberta. The sample has been statistically weighted where necessary to even better reflect the demographic distribution of the population (gender and age).
- Confidence The weighted sample yields a margin of error of [±] 2.8 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error increases when analyzing sub-samples of the data (Calgary [±] 4.9 percentage points, Edmonton and immediate area [±] 4.8 percentage points, North [±] 6.6 percentage points, South [±] 6.5 percentage points, 19 times out of 20).

Federal Vote Intention (%)

- The governing Conservative Party of Canada (CPC) commands 57.7% support amongst decided Alberta voters, three and one half times more support than its nearest competitor, the NDP (21.0%), and nearly five times more support than the federal Liberals (12.7%). The Green party commands 5.9% support while 2.7% of voters stated they would vote for some other party or candidate.
- The Conservatives have commanding leads in every region of the province with the NDP holding down second spot in all regions except Calgary where they are in a statistical tie for second with the Liberals. The Green party places third in the south outside of Calgary and comes close to rivaling the Liberals in the north outside of Edmonton.

- Conservative support is widespread (they lead in every demographic category), deep in their traditional areas of strength (Calgary), and within their traditional demographic groups (the wealthy, older voters, and the religious).
- Conservatives no longer have a gender gap in their support with women (57.9%) just as supportive as men (57.7%). Conservative support increases with age, but the NDP is statistically tied with them among Alberta's youngest voters with each party garnering slightly more than one-third of the youth vote.
- Clearly, Alberta voters have at least temporarily sided with the NDP over the Liberals as the most important opponents of the Conservatives. Almost twice as many Albertans would vote NDP (21.0%) than those who would vote Liberal (12.7%) if federal election was held today.
