Methodology

- Population The city of Lethbridge has a total population of 87,882 residents (2011 census) approximately 80% of which are 18 years of age or older (70,305). A total of 43,011 Lethbridge residents are male (48.9%) while 44,871 are female (51.1%). South Lethbridge is home to 30,504 residents (34.7%) while the rapidly expanding west side is now home to 32,063 residents (36.5%). There are 25,315 north Lethbridge residents (28.8%). Coaldale has a total population of 6,943 residents (2009 census).
- Sample Data Collected by Lethbridge College and Athabasca University students enrolled in STS270 Social Science Research Methods in the winter of 2012. Students interviewed 738 randomly selected, adult Lethbridge and Coaldale residents by telephone on February 11–12, 2012 under the supervision of School of Liberal Arts faculty member Faron Ellis. Telephone numbers were selected from a sample drawn from InfoCanada directories. We sincerely appreciate and thank all those who took time to respond to our survey. - Representativeness Analysis of the demographic data indicates that, within acceptable limits, the sample accurately represents the demographic distribution of the adult population within the city of Lethbridge. The sample has been statistically weighted where necessary to even better reflect that of the population (gender, age and area of the city of Lethbridge).
- Confidence The weighted sample yields a margin of error of ± 3.6 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error increases when analyzing sub-samples of the data. For example, the Lethbridge subsample margin of error is ± 3.9 percentage points, 19 times out of 20, while the Coaldale subsample has a margin of error of ± 9.5 percentage points 19 times out of 20.
- IB Commons Call Centre Students conducted interviews using the facilities of the Lethbridge College IB Commons Call Centre and applications developed by the Open Source Learning Lab. 


Federal Vote Intention (%)

- The governing Conservative Party of Canada (CPC) commands majority support amongst decided Lethbridge and Coaldale voters (53.1%), more than double that of its nearest competitor, the NDP (23.0%) and three times more support than the federal Liberals (17.9%). The federal Green Party commands 4.5% support while 1.6% of voters stated they would cast ballots for some other party or candidate.
- The Conservatives have commanding leads in all demographic groups with the NDP now most likely to hold down second spot. Conservative support is strongest in its traditional areas of strength outside of the city of Lethbridge, and among men, the wealthy and older voters.

Federal Vote Intention

- Federal Conservative party support is widespread (they lead in every demographic category), deep in their traditional areas of strength, and within their traditional demographic area of support such as seniors, the religious, and non-university grads.
- Coaldale residents (65.4%) are even more supportive of the Conservatives than are Lethbridge residents (52.1%), but even in Lethbridge the Conservatives lead their nearest rivals, the NDP (23.4%), by more than a two to one margin.
- The Conservatives have narrowed the traditional gender gap in their support with men (50.7%) only slightly more supportive of the Conservatives than are women (45.0%).
- Conservative support is approximately equal across all income categories while Liberal support is weakest amongst low income voters (10.2%). The NDP garners its highest support levels from university grads (28.7%) while the Green party receives its highest support levels from upper income voters (6.0%).
- The Conservatives garner substantially less support from university graduates (35.9%) than they do from those with other levels of education while the Liberals achieve their greatest support levels from university grads (19.8%) although the Conservatives still enjoy a commanding lead within this demographic group.
- Conservative support increases substantially as age increases, topping out at 60.2% amongst seniors. A less pronounced and inverse trend exists within the opposition parties' support, with the NDP (37.2%) leading among youth voters.
- Conservative support also increases with religious participation. Liberals support is relatively consistent between the religious and non-religious while the New Democrats receive their highest support levels from the least religious.
