

# Federal Vote Intention

Alberta Public Opinion Study – Fall 2015 October 14, 2015

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### Methodology

- Population The province of Alberta has a total population of 4,196,457 residents (Statistics Canada, July 1, 2015) approximately 78% of which are 18 years of age or older for an adult population of 3,283,067.
- Sample Data were collected by Lethbridge College students in the fall of 2015. Students interviewed 961 adult Alberta residents by telephone from October 3 to 8, 2015 under the supervision of principal investigator Faron Ellis PhD. Landline telephone numbers were selected from a sample drawn from InfoGroup directories and supplemented with a selection of mobile numbers from CSRL lists. - Representativeness Analysis of the demographic data indicates that, within acceptable limits, the sample accurately represents the demographic distribution of the adult population within the province of Alberta. The sample has been statistically weighted where necessary to even better reflect the demographic distribution of the population (gender, region of province, and age).
- Confidence The weighted sample yields a margin of error ± 3.16 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error increases when analyzing sub-samples of the data (Calgary ± 6.2 percentage points, Edmonton and immediate area ± 6.3 percentage points, North ± 6.7 percentage points, South ± 6.3 percentage points 19 times out of 20).
- IB Commons Call Centre Students conducted interviews using the facilities of the Lethbridge College IB Commons Call Center. We thank members of Lethbridge College's IT team for their support in helping maintain the IB Commons Call Center.
- Sponsorship These data are part of a larger study of the opinions and attitudes of Alberta residents conducted by the Citizen Society Research Lab at Lethbridge College. This particular set of questions was derived from student and faculty interest in the topics.




#### Federal Vote Intention – Alberta



The governing Conservative Party of Canada (CPC) continues to command majority support from decided Alberta voters (54.0%), an increase from what they held at the same time in 2014 (51.4%), but down from their peak in 2009 (61.1%). Among its opponents, the Liberals maintain their traditional second-place status (20.7%) while the NDP (17.6%) is up from last year (13.3%) but down from their 2011 peak (21.0%). The Green party commands 3.3% support, its lowest support in seven years, while 4.4% of voters stated they would vote for some other party or candidate.

#### Federal Vote Intention – Decided Alberta Voters (2009-2015)





Lack The Conservatives have commanding leads in every region of the province, particularly Calgary (59.6%) and the north (62.4%). The Liberals hold second spot in most areas of the province outside of Edmonton, where the NDP is second with 28.3% (versus 46.1% CPC support). Liberal support is strongest in the south outside of Calgary (27.1%).

#### Federal Vote Intention – Alberta



- Conservative support is widespread (they lead in every demographic category), deep in their traditional areas of strength and within their traditional demographic groups (Conservative support increases with income, age and religious participation).
- The Conservatives and Liberals have minor gender gaps in their decided vote support with women slightly more supportive than men, although women are almost twice as likely as men to be undecided with one week remaining in the 2015 campaign. The NDP garners slightly more support from women than from men.
- When compared to provincial vote intention, it appears that the federal Conservatives are capturing the lion's share of provincial PC (93.7%) and Wildrose (73.4%) supporters, and the federal Liberals monopolize the preferences of the smaller number of provincial Liberal voters (83.1%). Provincial NDP voters are much more diverse in their federal vote preferences with only half of all provincial NDP voters planning on casting ballots for the federal party (49.8%),
