# Federal Vote Intention <br> Lethbridge Public Opinion Study - Winter 2019 

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## Methodology

## Population

The city of Lethbridge has a total population of 99,769 residents ( 2018 census) approximately $80 \%$ of which are 18 years of age or older ( 79,800 ). A total of 48,883 Lethbridge residents are male ( $49.0 \%$ ), 50,697 are female ( $50.8 \%$ ) and 18 ( $0.2 \%$ ) prefer not to identify. South Lethbridge is home to 32,109 residents ( $32.2 \%$ ) while the rapidly expanding west side is now home to 39,960 residents (40.1\%). There are 27,700 north Lethbridge residents (27.8\%).

## Sample

Data Collected by Lethbridge College students in the winter of 2019. Students interviewed 882 randomly selected adult Lethbridge residents by telephone from February 9 to 13, 2019 under the supervision of CSRL Research Chair, Dr. Faron Ellis. ## Representativeness

Analysis of the demographic data indicates that, within acceptable limits, the sample accurately represents the demographic distribution of the adult population within the city of Lethbridge. The sample has been statistically weighted to even better reflect that of the population (sex, age, and area of the city of Lethbridge).

## Confidence

The sample yields a margin of error of $\pm 3.3$ percentage points, 19 times out of 20 . The margin of error increases when analyzing sub-samples of the data.

## IB Commons Call Centre

The CSRL operates as a division of the Centre for Applied Arts and Sciences. Students conducted interviews using the facilities of the Lethbridge College IB Commons Call Centre with support from the Lethbridge College Facility Management, Instructional Technology, and Audio Visual teams.

## Sponsorship

These data are part of a larger study of the opinions and attitudes of Lethbridge residents conducted by the Citizen Society Research Lab at Lethbridge College. This particular set of questions was derived from student, faculty and community interest in the topic.

## Federal Vote Intention

The federal Conservative Party of Canada holds a commanding lead in voter support within the city of Lethbridge. Conservative support $(43.6 \%)$ is more than double that of its nearest competitor, the federal Liberals (20.8\%), and nearly six times that of the federal NDP ( $7.7 \%$ ). Only $3.6 \%$ of voters currently support the federal Green Party and fewer still are planning on voting for the new People's Party of Canada ( $1.1 \%$ ). Another $6.1 \%$ plan to vote for some other party or candidate while nearly one in six Lethbridge residents (17.1\%) is currently undecided.

The Conservatives lead in every demographic category and receive their strongest support from within their traditional areas of strength such as men, middle and upper income voters, and provincial UCP and Alberta party supporters.

## Federal Vote Intention (February 2019)

The Conservatives have a modest gender gap in their support with slightly more male (46.9\%) than female (39.2\%) supporters. The Liberals and NDP have no significant gender gaps in their support. Women ( $23.3 \%$ ) are twice as likely as are men ( $11.5 \%$ ) to be undecided about which party they will support in the next election.
Conservative support increases as income increases, peaking at half of all upper-income voters ( $50.3 \%$ ). Liberal support decreases as income increases with lower-income resident (25.5\%) more likely to vote Liberal than middle-income (21.3\%) and upper-income (19.1\%) residents. NDP support is also concentrated in the lower income group (14.0\%), dropping sharply to only $5.1 \%$ amongst middle-income voters and $7.7 \%$ with upper-income earners.

Conservative support is strongest among the very religious (50.2\%). Liberal support is strongest among the moderately religious but varies little between voters with different levels of religious participation. The NDP is weakest among the very religious (5.5\%).

The Conservatives lead among all education groups, including university graduates (38.6\%), but their support is substantially higher among college graduates ( $53.2 \%$ ) and other education groups. Liberal support is strongest with university graduates ( $29.7 \%$ ). NDP support is relatively consistent across all education groups.
Conservatives lead in all age groups, but are tied with the Liberals for the lead (30.1\%) among Lethbridge youth.
Provincial UCP voters are most likely to vote for the federal Conservatives ( $93.7 \%$ ), while four out of every five provincial Liberal supporters plan to vote for the federal Liberals ( $80.2 \%$ ). Demonstrating that they perceive a clear distinction between federal and provincial partisanship, provincial NDP voters are more likely to cast a ballot for the federal Liberals (37.5\%) than they are for the federal NDP ( $26.1 \%$ ). A majority of provincial Alberta Party voters ( $56.1 \%$ ) plan to also seek an alternative to the mainstream parties when they vote in the next federal election.
