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
Methodology

- Population The city of Lethbridge has a total population of 81,692 residents (2007 municipal census) approximately 80% of which are 18 years of age or older (65,832). A total of 39,941 Lethbridge residents are male (48.9%) while 41,751 are female (51.1%). South Lethbridge is home to 29,225 residents (35.8%) while the rapidly expanding west side is now home to 28,443 residents (34.8%). There are 24,024 north Lethbridge residents (29.4%). Unless otherwise specified, the data presented below represent the city of Lethbridge population.
- Sample Data were collected by Lethbridge College and Athabasca University students enrolled in STS270 Social Science Research Methods and PSC150 Local Government in the fall of 2007. Students interviewed 866 adult city of Lethbridge residents and 140 Coaldale adult residents by telephone from September 26th to 30th 2007. Telephone numbers were selected from a sample drawn from Info Canada directories. We sincerely appreciate and thank all those who took time out of their day to respond to our survey. - Representativeness Analysis of the demographic data indicates that, within acceptable limits, the sample accurately represents the demographic distribution of the adult population within the city of Lethbridge and the town of Coaldale. The sample has been statistically weighted where necessary to even better reflect the demographic distribution of the population (gender and area of the city of Lethbridge).
- Confidence The weighted sample yields a margin of error of ± 3.3%, 19 times out of 20 for the full 2007 Lethbridge sample and ± 8.2%, 19 times out of 20 for the full Coaldale sample. The margin of error increases when analyzing sub-samples of the data.
- IB Commons Call Centre Students conducted interviews using the facilities of the Lethbridge College IB Commons Call Centre and applications developed by the Open Source Learning Lab. We thank Dr. James Manis and the OSLL for their efforts in working with us to establish and maintain the IB Commons Call Centre.

(18.7% for Lethbridge and 16.4% for Coaldale).



When analyzing different demographic groups within the Lethbridge population, we observe that west Lethbridge residents (34.3%), lower income earners (38.8%), and the youth (37.9%) are the most likely to think the premier is doing a good job. South Lethbridge residents (20.1%), upper incomer earners (23.0%) and university graduates (26.6%) are among those most likely to state that the premier is performing poorly. Interestingly, very few gender differences are evident concerning the premier's performance.

Progressive Conservative voters are most likely to rate the premier positively (42.3%) while Liberal voters are the most negative (33.5%). Liberal voters rate the premier's performance more negatively than do either New Democrat voters (23.5%), Alliance voters (21.4%), and Green voters (15.8%), with the later two groups more positive than negative. Undecided voters are also slightly more positive (24.0%) than negative (22.7%).

Premier Ed Stelmach's Impact on Progressive Conservative Vote



Alberta premier Ed Stelmach's impact on Progressive Conservative vote intentions in Lethbridge and Coaldale is varied. Both Lethbridge (47.9%) and Coaldale (48.8%) residents are most likely to say that their opinion of the premier will have no impact on their vote. However, in Lethbridge more residents say they are less likely to vote PC (30.1%) in the next election than those who say they are more likely (22.0%) because of their opinions of the premier. In Coaldale the situation is reversed, with slightly more residents more likely to vote PC (29.3%) than less likely (22.0%).



When analyzing different demographic groups within the Lethbridge population, we observe that lower income earners (30.0%), and seniors (37.4%) are among those most likely to say their opinion of the premier will make them more likely to vote PC in the next provincial election. North Lethbridge residents (35.7%), upper income earners (35.4%), university graduates (36.4%) and baby boomers (35.7%) are among those most likely to state that their opinion of the premier will make them less likely to vote PC.



Progressive Conservative voters (32.4%) are most likely to sate their opinion of the premier will make them more likely to vote PC, while Liberal voters (49.2%) are most likely to state that their evaluations of the premier will make them less likely to vote PC. New Democrat (35.8%), Alliance (39.5%) and Green (38.9%) voters are more likely to state that the premier is having a negative impact on their likelihood of voting PC in the next election than a positive impact. Undecided voters are also approximately four times more likely to state that their opinions of the premier will have a negative (41.5%) rather than a positive (10.8%) impact on the likelihood of them voting PC in the next provincial election.

Provincial Vote Intention

The Alberta Progressive Conservative party currently has a commanding lead in vote intention support in both Lethbridge (48.5%) and Coaldale (56.4%). The provincial Liberals are stronger in Lethbridge (22.7%) than they are in Coaldale (12.0%). The New Democrats place third in Lethbridge (7.0%) and fourth in Coaldale (5.3%) where they are bested by the Alberta Alliance (6.8%) and the Green party (5.3%). In Lethbridge, the Alliance (5.5%) and Green party (5.0%) trail the other parties. Only 11.2% of Lethbridge voters and 15.0% of Coaldale voters are currently undecided about for which party they intend to vote.



The Alberta Progressive Conservatives are most supported by men (50.7%), north (49.2%) and west (49.5%) Lethbridge residents, and middle aged and older voters. The Liberals are strongest in south (25.7%) and west Lethbridge (22.7%), with upper income earners (26.3%), university graduates (32.2%) and with baby boomers (25.6%). The Alberta New Democrats' strengths are with lower income earners (9.8%), university graduates (11.0%) and gen-xers (11.2%).



Although Lethbridge vote intentions currently favor the governing Progressive Conservatives, it should be remembered that the provincial Liberals have overcome similar support deficits within the city of Lethbridge over the course of the past three provincial elections campaigns, resulting in them winning half of all Lethbridge seats in the last four provincial elections.
