

# Provincial Vote Intention - Lethbridge

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#### Methodology

- Population The city of Lethbridge has a total population of 90,417 residents (2013 census) approximately 80% of which are 18 years of age or older (72,330). A total of 43,011 Lethbridge residents are male (48.9%) while 44,871 are female (51.1%). South Lethbridge is home to 30,655 residents (33.9%) while the rapidly expanding west side is now home to 33,988 residents (37.6%). There are 25,774 north Lethbridge residents (28.5%). Coaldale has a total population of 7,493 residents (2011 census).
- Sample Data Collected by Lethbridge College students enrolled in a variety of social science courses in the winter of 2014. Students interviewed 607 randomly selected, adult Lethbridge and Coaldale residents by telephone on February 8–9, 2014 under the supervision of School of Liberal Arts faculty members Faron Ellis and Marda Schindeler. - Representativeness Analysis of the demographic data indicates that, within acceptable limits, the sample accurately represents the demographic distribution of the adult population within the city of Lethbridge. The sample has been statistically weighted to even better reflect that of the population (sex, age, and area of the city of Lethbridge).
- Confidence The weighted sample yields a margin of error of ± 4.0 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error increases when analyzing sub-samples of the data. For example, the Lethbridge subsample margin of error is ± 4.2 percentage points, 19 times out of 20, while the Coaldale subsample has a margin of error of ± 11.2 percentage points 19 times out of 20.
- IB Commons Call Centre Students conducted interviews using the facilities of the Lethbridge College IB Commons Call Centre.
- Sponsorship These data are part of a larger study of the opinions and attitudes of Lethbridge residents conducted by the Citizen Society Research Lab at Lethbridge College. This particular question was derived from student and faculty interest in the topics.



## **Provincial Vote Intention**

- The governing Alberta Progressive Conservatives (20.0%) have lost their lead in Lethbridge West and are currently embroiled in a close four-way battle with each of their opponents. All parties garner approximately one-fifth of the vote, led by the NDP (21.5%) and Wildrose (21.1%), with the Liberals (20.0%) garnering exactly the same support levels as the PCs. Fully 15.1% of Lethbridge West voters remain undecided while only 2.3% plan on voting for other parties or candidates.
- In Lethbridge East, the Progressive Conservatives (24.7%) still lead, with the resurgent Liberals (18.7%) and Wildrose (17.9%) battling for second. The NDP commands 12.3% support in Lethbridge East where a further 7.7% of voters plan on casting ballots for other parties or candidates. Nearly one-fifth of all Lethbridge East voters are currently undecided about which party they will vote for.
- As has been the trend for some time now, both PC and Wildrose support tends to be less within the city of Lethbridge than it is Alberta-wide. Conversely, the provincial Liberal and NDP parties tend to outperform their province-wide support levels.



### Provincial Vote Intention - All Potential Voters (%) (February 2014)

- Lethbridge West
  - Tight four-way race with NDP leading at 21.5%
  - Wildrose statistically even at 21.1%
  - PCs and Liberals also statistically tied at 20.0%
  - 15.1% of potential voters are undecided
- Lethbridge East
  - PCs hold lead at 24.7%
  - Resurgent Liberals in second at 18.7%
  - Wildrose statistically tied with Liberals at 17.9%
  - NDP now running fourth at 12.3%
  - 7.7% say they will cast ballots for other parties
  - 18.7% of potential voters are undecided



- Wildrose continues to exhibit a significant gender gap in its support with nearly twice as much male (25.1%) support as female (12.7%). All other parties have a slight female gender gap.
- The Progressive Conservatives lead among seniors (31.2%) with Wildrose close behind (26.9%). Wildrose leads among baby boomers (22.5%) with all three other parties close behind at between 16% and 17% support. Liberal and NDP strengths are with younger voters.
- The Progressive Conservatives lead among both upper income (25.0%) and lower income (29.4%) voters. Wildrose strength is found among upper income voters (22.4%) while the NDP strength is with middle income voters (20.5%). The Liberals have the most consistent support across all income categories.
