

## Methodology



- Sample Data were collected by Lethbridge College students enrolled in STS270 Social Science Research Methods in the winter of 2008. Students interviewed 502 adult city of Lethbridge residents by telephone on February 9 and 10, 2008. Telephone numbers were selected from a sample drawn from Info Canada directories. We sincerely appreciate and thank all those who took time out of their day to respond to our survey. - Representativeness Analysis of the demographic data indicates that, within acceptable limits, the sample accurately represents the demographic distribution of the adult population within the city of Lethbridge. The sample has been statistically weighted where necessary to even better reflect the demographic distribution of the population (gender, age and area of the city of Lethbridge).
- Confidence The weighted sample yields a margin of error of ± 4.4%, 19 times out of 20 for the full winter 2008 Lethbridge sample and ± 6.2% 19 times out of 20 for each of Lethbridge West (n=256) and Lethbridge East (n=246). The margin of error increases when analyzing further sub-samples of the data.

#### Lethbridge Provincial Vote Intention (February 2008)

City of Lethbridge voters have returned one Progressive Conservative MLA (Lethbridge West) and one Liberal MLA (Lethbridge East) in each of the last four provincial elections. The data that follows demonstrates that in both Lethbridge ridings, tight contests are being fought between the candidates of these two parties. In fact, although the Progressive Conservative candidates enjoy small leads in both contests, neither of these leads is statistically significant, and in both ridings substantial number of voters remain undecided.



Analysis of the demographic distribution of the candidates' support bases provides few clues as to which candidates are advantaged, especially when taking into consideration the undecided voters in each riding.



Clearly, both of these contests are going to be decided by the abilities of the local organizations to Get Out The Vote (GOVT), which includes voter identification, voter contact, and delivering their voters on election day.
