Alberta Public Opinion Study – Fall 2010

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### Methodology


- Population The province of Alberta has a total population of 3,720,946 residents (July 1, 2010) approximately 77% of which are 18 years of age or older for an adult population of approximately 2,865,000.
- Sample Data were collected by Lethbridge College and Athabasca University students enrolled in STS270 Social Science Research Methods and PSC150 Local Government in the fall of 2010. Students interviewed 1,067 adult Alberta residents by telephone from October 2<sup>nd</sup> to 3<sup>rd</sup> 2010 under the supervision of Canadian Studies faculty members Faron Ellis PhD and Marda Schindeler MA. Telephone numbers were selected from a sample drawn from InfoCanada directories. We sincerely thank all participants who took time out of their day to respond to our inquiries. - Representativeness Analysis of the demographic data indicates that, within acceptable limits, the sample accurately represents the demographic distribution of the adult population within the province of Alberta. The sample has been statistically weighted where necessary to even better reflect the demographic distribution of the population (gender and age).
- Confidence The weighted sample yields a margin of error of ± 3.0 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error increases when analyzing sub-samples of the data (Calgary ± 5.1 percentage points, Edmonton and immediate area ± 5.3 percentage points, North ± 7.2 percentage points, South ± 7.6 percentage points, 19 times out of 20).

### Resource Development and the Environment

When considering the balance between resource development and the environment, a majority of Albertans (57.7%) believes more emphasis should be placed on the environment. Just over one-quarter of Albertans (28.6%) believe the balance is good now, while 14.0% believe more emphasis should be placed on resource development.

Opinion is relatively consistent throughout the province with Calgary (56.4%) and Edmonton (61.5%) residents most likely to favor more environmental emphasis. Albertans outside of the two major cities are more likely than Calgarians or Edmontonians to favor resource development with northerners the most likely to think the emphasis should be shifted towards resource development (21.3%) and the least likely to want more emphasis on the environment (53.4%). Southern residents, although still supportive of a shift towards the environment (55.6%), are among the most likely to favor an increased emphasis on resource development (17.3%).

### Resource Development and the Environment

- Women (62.3%) are slightly more likely than men (52.6%) to favor placing more emphasis on the environment.
- Interestingly, income has no significant impact on opinion with all income groups reporting majority support for increasing emphasis on the environment.
- It is also noteworthy that age has no significant impact on opinion. Interestingly, although Alberta's youth are most likely to emphasize the environment (62.3%), they are also among the most likely to want to emphasize resource development (15.7%). Overall, seniors are the most likely to think the balance is good now (35.8%).
- Education levels are significant in that university grads are significantly more likely to favor placing more emphasis on the environment (65.0%) and less interested in emphasizing resource development (11.3%), especially when compared to those with the least amount of formal education who are among the most likely to favor resource development (19.1%) and among the least likely to favor emphasizing the environment (51.0%).
- Clear and significant differences are measured between supporters of Alberta's major political parties. New Democrat (71.6%) and Liberal (68.9%) supporters are most in favor of emphasizing the environment. Few significant differences exist between partisans with respect to their levels of support for increasing the emphasis on resource development. PC (37.1%) and Wildrose Alliance (36.5%) supporters are most likely to support the balance between resources development and the environment as it is now.
